Iran’s nuke stand

In an unexpected statement, Iran’s Deputy Foreign Minister Majid Takht-e Ravanchi, has said that the country is willing to accept certain restrictions on its nuclear programme in exchange for lifting of economic sanctions, though ending uranium enrichment is not one of them, terming it non-negotiable.

As per Iran International, the Deputy FM said, “We can agree to have limits on our nuclear programme, and in return the economic sanctions must be lifted. “Iran can be flexible on the capacities and limits of enrichment but cannot agree to stop enrichment under any circumstance because it’s essential, and we need to rely on ourselves, not on empty promises.” Ravanchi further said that one principal obstacle to renewed talks with the US

Talks suspended

So far, Tehran and Washington have held five rounds of talks between April and May this year in Muscat, Oman, and Rome, Italy. A sixth round was scheduled to take place in Muscat on June 15 but was indefinitely suspended, after Israel launched airstrikes on Iran two days earlier, culminating in the 12-day Israel-Iran war.

was the need for clarity over past US actions, referencing the US bombing of Iranian sites on June 22. “The United States should explain to us about the reasons it resorted to the use of force against us. If we want to have a genuine dialogue, everybody has to be transparent. The United States in fact tricked us. They pretended that they wanted to talk, but they decided to go for the military option.” Emphasising Tehran’s willingness to keep diplomacy open, he said, “Iran remains prepared to engage in dialogue, but we cannot put an exact time on the

dialogue. “There have been messages going back and forth between Iran and the United States through intermediaries,” he added. In light of the Israeli assault, and the US bombing, post ceasefire, Iran suspended its treaty with the International Atomic Energy Agency, accusing it of harbouring political convictions, and supplying critical nuclear data to Israel. Recently, Tehran has agreed to re-negotiate its cooperation with the UN nuclear watchdog during Rafael Grossi’s visit, though has ruled out inspections

Child labour

According to the International Labour Organisation (ILO) Minimum Age Convention, 1973 (Convention No. 138), child labour refers to:

- Any work performed by children under the age of 12,
- Non-light work done by children aged 12–14,
- Hazardous work carried out by children aged 15–17.

Child labour is any form of work that is harmful to a child’s physical and mental health, well-being, or development. It often interferes with their education and deprives them of a proper childhood.

The root causes of child labour include extreme poverty, lack of access to quality education, social inequality, discrimination, armed conflict, and natural disasters. When families are unable to meet basic needs, children – some as young as 5 – are pushed into the workforce to contribute to household income.

Despite international laws and national efforts, child labour remains widespread in many parts of the world. Governments may



change, but progress on eliminating child labour has often been slow and inconsistent. Tragically, many of these children toil in silence and invisibility - unnoticed and unprotected.

According to data from the Census 2011, the number of child laborers in India is 10.1 million out of which 5.6 million are boys and 4.5 million are girls. In 2021, the closure of 1.5 million schools due to pandemic and lockdowns in India has impacted 247 million children enrolled in elementary and secondary schools and added to the risk of them slipping into child labour and unsafe migration.

Minister Scindia to release commemorative stamp
Delhi Assembly to celebrate centenary
of first Indian Speaker

Amit Shah to inaugurate conference

New Delhi, Aug 12: The Delhi Legislative Assembly will host the All India Speakers’ Conference on August 24-25, marking 100 years since Vitthalbhai Patel became the first Indian to preside over the country’s Central Legislative Assembly. The event will include a grand exhibition, a documentary on Patel’s life and parliamentary role, and the release of a special commemorative postage stamp. The conference will be inaugurated by Union Home Minister Amit Shah and conclude under the chairmanship of Lok Sabha Speaker Om Birla. According to Delhi Assembly Speaker Vijender Gupta, 32 Speakers and Deputy Speakers from State

Legislative Assemblies, along with Chairmen and Deputy Chairmen from Legislative Councils, have confirmed their participation. Keynote addresses will be delivered by Rajya Sabha Deputy Chairman Harivansh Narayan Singh, Union Minister for Culture and Tourism Gajendra Singh Shekhawat, Union Minister for Parliamentary Affairs Kiren Rijiju, and former Lok Sabha Speaker Meira Kumar. Delhi Lieutenant Governor Vinai Kumar Saxena, Chief Minister Rekha Gupta, Deputy Speaker Mohan Singh Bisht, and Delhi Cabinet Minister Parvesh Sahib Singh will also participate.

The commemorative stamp will be released by Union Minister for Communications and Development of North Eastern Region Jyotiraditya M. Scindia during the inaugural session. The thematic discussions will focus on Patel’s role in shaping India’s Constitution and parliamentary institutions, the contributions of pre-Independence Central Legislative Assembly leaders to the freedom struggle, the application of artificial intelligence in governance, and India’s positioning as the “Mother of Democracy.” Gupta highlighted the Assembly’s historical significance, noting that the building-constructed in 1912-was the site of early debates on education for all, labour reforms, and women’s suffrage. It also witnessed protests against colonial measures such as the Rowlett Act and historic events including Bhagat Singh’s protest inside the Assembly. The exhibition will feature archival records, photographs, and verbatim proceedings from these moments in history. The documentary will chronicle Gandhi’s visits, protests against the Simon Commission, and the day Patel took office as Speaker in 1925. State guest honours will be extended to Speakers and Deputy Speakers from across India, with 125 liaison officers appointed to manage hospitality. Cultural programmes and dinners will be hosted by the Chief Minister of Delhi, the Speaker of the Lok Sabha, and the Lieutenant Governor over the course of the conference. The event will conclude with a Yamuna Aarti and a briefing on river rejuvenation initiatives. Gupta said the Assembly aims to combine heritage with innovation, citing initiatives such as paperless proceedings and solar power use. The conference, he added, will not only commemorate Patel’s contribution but also explore a roadmap for strengthening parliamentary democracy.

Aus beefs up naval power with \$ 6.5 bn Japan deal

Canberra, Aug 12: Australia has announced a \$ 6.5 billion deal to buy advanced warships from Japan, a move that can go a long way to making Canberra a Pacific maritime power and Tokyo a major weapons exporter, analysts say. The Australian Defense Ministry said it will buy 11 of Japan’s Mogami-class frigates, stealthy, state-of-the-art surface combatants that analysts say are equal to - or in some respects better than - anything China or even the United States is putting in the water, reports *CNN*. The Australian Defense Ministry said the first three warships will be built in Japan and the remaining eight in Australia. While announcing the deal with a fellow member of the US-led Quad defence group last week, Australia’s Minister for Defense Industry Pat Conroy called it “another step towards delivering a much larger and more lethal navy, with stealth frigates that will reassure our allies and deter our adversaries.” Australia’s main security concern is its growing neighborhood rivalry with China, which was stoked earlier this

year when a Chinese naval task force circumnavigated the continent and held live-fire exercises off Australian shores, forcing dozens of passenger planes to divert from their usual flight paths. Canberra says the vessels will be “upgraded” Mogami-class ships - bigger than a version already in service with Japan’s Maritime Self-Defense Force ? giving them more firepower and a longer unrefueled range of approximately 11,500 miles. Japan’s Defense Minister General Nakatani echoed Conroy’s sentiment, calling the deal a “big step” that will boost Tokyo’s security cooperation with a special strategic partner, Japanese public broadcaster *NHK* reported. The new warships, built by Mitsubishi Heavy Industries, will have 32 Mk 41 vertical launch cells, capable of firing surface-to-air missiles and anti-ship missiles, the Defense Ministry said. These will enable the Mogamis to fire 128 air defence missiles, four times the number current Australian surface vessels can fire, Conroy said. Analysts noted the Lockheed Martin-made Mk 41 launch cells are big enough to carry Tomahawk cruise missiles ? which, with a range of 1,000 miles, could greatly extend the warships’ target area. The Mk 41 cells could also be used for long-range anti-submarine rockets, enabling them to better hunt down fleeing nuclear-powered submarines, said Sidharth Kaushal, a research fellow in sea power at the Royal United Services Institute (RUSI) in London. The Japanese-made frigates are also lauded for their lean manning, needing only a crew of 90, compared with 170

on Australia’s current ANZAC-class frigates the Mogamis will replace. The smaller crew is important for countries like Japan and Australia that face military recruiting challenges. “It’s a much bigger ship, which is able to operate with a much smaller crew, and that’s a reflection of how modern this ship is,” Australian Deputy Prime Minister Richard Marles said at a press conference on Tuesday.

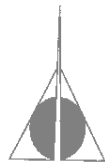
